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Expect delays at Dallas Hwy and Whitlock Ave

Crews will start clearing work for the Whitlock Avenue trail segment of the Kennesaw Mountain Pedestrian Improvements on Monday, Oct. 25. Significant delays are expected along Dallas Highway/Whitlock Avenue between John Ward Road and Cheatham Hill Drive. Crews will be working in the area from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on weekdays, and road capacity will be reduced to one lane.

Traffic delays are expected to be worse in the afternoon in the westbound direction. Alternate routes are recommended.



FY 2022 Fundraising Goals

Following is a list of the fundraising goals for this year:

- \$2,000 FY 2023 Friends administrative budget.
- \$10,000 Funds to be used in conjunction with the Park to acquire an additional cannon and trailer (total cost estimated to be \$82,000) for the Living History program.
- \$3200 to provide for the purchase of 5 bicycle racks and signage for them.
- \$15,000 seed money for the 160th Anniversary of the Battle of Kennesaw Mountain (June, 2024) total estimate for event is expected to be approximately \$150,000.
- \$10,000 to fund various activities of the Living History program, the Friends and the Kennesaw Mountain Trail Club.

Total to be raised during the current fiscal year - \$40,200. See the bottom of page 7 for ways to donate to the Friends for these projects.

In addition, the establishment of an Endowment Fund was discussed and approved. Details will be discussed at future Board meetings.

Kennesaw Mountain's Failed Hotels

In the 1800s, Marietta was a popular North Georgia summer destination with several hotels. One of these antebellum hotels, the Rock Springs Water Cure Establishment, sat at the base of Kennesaw Mountain. After the Civil War, the Western and Atlantic Railroad began to promote Marietta's Civil War history and gave it the moniker "the Gem City of Georgia." While this title is not often used today, it helped to bring many visitors to the city at the end of the nineteenth century.

and Investment Company (M. & N. G. R. E. & I. Co.) announced their plans to build a streetcar line from downtown Marietta to the Kennesaw Marble Works and Kennesaw Mountain. A branch of the line would head to the top of the mountain where a hotel would be constructed. It was estimated the hotel would cost around \$75,000 to build, and an extra \$30,000 would be spent beautifying the mountain. Despite the immense amount of development, the earthworks would be preserved. Around the same time, a correspondent for the Atlanta Evening Journal mused that an observatory at the mountain top would be "very attractive," but his idea seems to not be connected to the Marietta and North Georgia Real Estate and Investment Company's plan.

ven though Georgia is not known for its temperate summers, this did not deter the project's promotion as a summer resort. The July 19, 1888 Marietta Journal mentioned that

"To Northern people it seems ridiculous to come South to spend the hot season, but we know from experience that if they come to Georgia's mountains for the summer, they will return year to year. To the people of the North that go to Florida to spend the winter, we say stop here for a day at least and take a ride to the top of grand old Kennesaw and view the grandest country that the sun ever shown upon."

who was "highly complimented" by the people of Marietta. J. H. Mountain was also involved with a similar streetcar development in Atlanta called the Atlanta Traction Street Railway line. William Joseph Marion Hames, the then-owner of Kennesaw Mountain, was involved with this first endeavor to place a hotel on his mountain. He evidently was soon disillusioned with the idea and backed out of the project in November 1888. Another person involved with the project, H. C. Birch, also backed out that same month.

project, no further mention has been found. The next year the Marietta and North Georgia Real Estate and Investment Company opened the "East End" neighborhood near Marietta National Cemetery which is the company's longest-lasting impact on our area.

hile not connected to his Marietta plans, the fate of J. H. Mountain deserves to be shared. According to the April 7, 1897 Atlanta Constitution, Mountain made "a good-size fortune" in his Atlanta Traction Street Railway line, "but subsequently lost all his money." By 1896 he had moved to South Carolina, where he attempted to build a town called Garlington in Laurens County. After a year of work "all of his promises came to naught" before he disappeared. Mountain fled to Atlanta and was chased by the sheriff. He was arrested but due to a misunderstanding managed to escape. Rumors spread he had committed suicide by jumping into the Chattahoochee River, but it was a ruse created by Mountain to escape the law. He was finally arrested in Alabama.

ver the next several years, a few off-hand mentions of potential hotels on Kennesaw Mountain can be found in newspapers, but no actual plans can be found until 1915. In December of that year, William Tate Holland, Virgil McCleskey, and C. M. Dobbs purchased the mountain from William Hames. The three men, organized later as the Holland Realty Company, planned to build a streetcar line to the mountain, a road to the top, and a hotel at the summit. The hotel "would have been second not even to Lookout Mountain."

In 1916, the plan was stopped dead in its tracks. A bill was passed banning railroad tracks parallel to the route of the Western & Atlantic Railroad. This bill stopped the plans for a streetcar running from Marietta to the mountain. The Holland Realty Company continued to work on its future strategy. In the meantime, in 1921 they allowed the City of Marietta to open a quarry on the side of Kennesaw Mountain, free of charge, to pave city streets. Judge Kennesaw Mountain Landis was invited to the opening of the quarry, but he was unable to attend.

In August 1923, the Holland Realty Company announced plans for a toll road to the summit of Kennesaw Mountain. The mountain would be developed as a "pleasure resort" featuring a "dancing pavilion and eating lodge; a museum building; a swimming pool, and... a tourist hotel to crown the top of Little Kennesaw." Later accounts mention the planned eating lodge would be able to hold "250 to 350 people," and that the dance pavilion would be able to hold "200 couples." A memorial observation tower and casino were also mentioned in later newspapers. To make these grand plans a reality, a company was created called the Kennesaw Mountain Battlefield Association. The project was expected to cost \$150,000.

onstruction of the road began on May 24, 1924. Present at the ground-breaking ceremony held that day was Governor Clifford Walker, who "turned the first shovel of dirt." The May 25, 1924 Atlanta Constitution noted that "William Tate Holland was praised as the originator of the scheme. He has devoted his time and influence to the preservation

of the relics at Kennesaw. It is planned to preserve the battlements as they were at the conclusion of the war."

According to the *Atlanta* Constitution, "hundreds of motorists" were able to drive to the summit on opening day. It cost fifty cents for cars to drive to the top, and pedestrians could walk for free up the twenty-foot-wide road. A celebration was planned for a later date, and it was hoped that both Kennesaw Mountain Landis and General John J. Pershing would be able to attend. It should be noted that this road later fell into disrepair. The Civilian Conservation Corps attempted in the 1930s to expand, improve, and reroute the old road. The work would not be completed until after World War II.

t the end of May 1925, the Ben Padgett Company announced it was selling 200 half-acre lots on Kennesaw Mountain in conjunction with the Battlefield Association's project. By this time, the cost of the hotel's construction had risen to \$500,000. Ads for Padgett's development can be found in the *Atlanta Constitution* for several months after the announcement.

In late 1925, it was proposed the mountain become a federally owned park, and it is unclear why the development plans ended so suddenly. Plans for the governments purchase of the mountain did not materialize until the 1930s when the land from the Holland Realty Company and Kennesaw Mountain Battlefield Association was acquired through condemnation.

whe two plans for hotels on Kennesaw Mountain ultimately went unrealized, but thanks to that fact, the mountain sentinel guarding Marietta has been preserved.

John Ward Creek Crossing Closed to Horseback Riders

Kennesaw, GA – Effective immediately, the John Ward Creek crossing just south of the Illinois Monument is closed to horseback riders until further notice. This closure stems from a safety concern due to hazardous conditions relating to an unstable streambed. The closure affects the creek crossing between Milepost 3.5 and Milepost 4 of the Kolb's Farm East Trail.

Superintendent Patrick Gamman states, "We are concerned for the safety of all park users. Crossing John Ward Creek at this section of the trail poses a risk that we want to alert our horse community to, as it could potentially cause harm to both horse and rider. We will be working as quickly as possible to mitigate this problem."

Dan McCook was a notable and well-loved general involved in the Union assault on Cheatham Hill. Col. Dan was also a member of a prominent family with a rich military history known as 'The Fighting McCooks'. Join one of our rangers as we talk about Col. Dan and his family.

On June 27th, 1864, nearly 9,000 Union soldiers made a historic charge into what they believed would be death or capture. February 6 @ 11:00 am - 11:30 am Artillery on the Mountain

In the summer of 1864, the peak of Kennesaw Mountain was more than just a scenic location. Confederate soldiers utilized the 1,800 ft. vantage point for a light artillery position just before the battle of Kennesaw Mountain. Learn about the men and tactics used at this position and more. This program will be held just below the peak of Kennesaw Mountain, just past stone viewing station.

February 12 @ 11:00 am - 11:30 am 'Shaping Lincoln: Abraham Lincoln Before his Presidency'

In recognition of Abraham Lincoln's 213th Birthday, this program discusses Abraham Lincoln prior to his presidency and what shaped the 16th President of the United States of America. This program will be held at the Visitor Center patio.

February $13^{\rm th}$ @ 11:00 am - 12:30 pm Guided Mountain Top Hike This hike will begin at the Visitor Center. The Ranger will take you up the 1.1-mile trail to the summit of Big Kennesaw. You will be learn about the history of the mountain from before it got its roots to the present. The climb can be challenging for some so please make sure to bring water and proper footwear.

February 26th @ 11:00 am - 11:30 am 13th Amendment Program As the first amendment to the U.S. Constitution to be passed during the Reconstruction area, the 13th Amendment abolished slavery in the United States. In recognition of African American history

month, the Ranger will discuss the history behind, the debate for, and ultimately the ratification of the amendment. This program will be held at the Visitor Center patio.


